




The Health Reforms



- NHS commissioners supported by a new **NHS Commissioning Board** which will authorise CCGs, commission some services including primary care, and host clinical networks and senates
- Most NHS care commissioned by **Clinical Commissioning Groups**
- All **NHS providers** to become Foundation Trusts
- A stronger role for **local authorities** in shaping services, with new responsibility for local population health improvement
- New **Health and Wellbeing Boards** within each higher tier local authority area

Focus on Outcomes

- The Secretary of State will set the strategic direction through the mandate for the NHS Commissioning Board and the NHS Outcomes Framework


NHS Commissioning Board

- Accountable for meeting the objectives and outcomes set out in the mandate which will be consulted on and laid before parliament. The Board will be responsible for ensuring an effective and comprehensive system of clinical commissioning groups

Clinical Commissioning Groups (CCGs)

- Will commission most NHS Services
- Will have new duties including promoting the NHS constitution, securing continuous improvements in quality of services commissioned, reducing inequalities, securing integration, enabling choice and patient involvement and promoting innovation and research

The Health Reforms: health and wellbeing boards



- Core membership includes : DCS, DASS and one local councillor, DPH, Clinical Commissioning Groups and HealthWatch – with option for more
- Mutual obligations on Councils and NHS commissioners for joint strategic needs assessment (JSNA) and joint health and wellbeing strategies (JHWS) – in partnership
- Expectation that HWBs are involved throughout the NHS commissioning process – so commissioning plans are in line with the JHWS
- Joint commissioning and integrated provision promoted
- HWB to have a duty to involve users and the public in the JSNA and JHWS
- Local HealthWatch will bring a stronger voice for patients and the public - including children and young people

The Health Reforms: Local Authority led Public Health:



- Directors of Public Health (DsPH) jointly appointed by the Public Health Services and Local Councils, employed by Councils
- Councils, through DsPH, lead on health improvement with ring-fenced budget
- First allocations to Councils in April 2013, (c £5.2bn ringfenced)
- Outcomes framework for Public Health
- Councils free to define contribution to national outcomes
- Public Health Service will need to work closely with the NHS and children's services

JSNAs and joint health and wellbeing strategies tools for shared leadership



HWB provides forum for repositioning JSNA as truly jointly owned and leading to joint commissioning decisions to serve the whole population.
